### ***From the Board***

The Board of Trustees has accepted the recent Assessment Report and are currently looking at the three recommendations:

1. Do a review of building use. This is a data gathering process where we will track spaces and times when there is too much crowding. The Staff has done a very good job of utilizing space usage to alleviate congested areas and spaces.
2. Continue to focus on annual giving and try to build financial resources. How do we live out our UU values of inclusiveness and honoring each person within our growing economic diversity? The congregation needs to fully support the Stewardship Campaign.
3. Keep moving toward clarity on our specific mission goals, then allow those changes to guide the changes we decide to make. This is to continue the process toward resolving our growth issues.

The Board is continually looking to the future and what steps need to be taken to help us along the way.

### **Meet: (v) to gather, encounter, engage, fulfill**

Meeting. Mention the word and you can get groans, sighs, and rolled eyes. Although often viewed as a chore, the **Leadership Development Team (LDT)** has been thinking about meetings differently. At our monthly meetings, we have an agenda that outlines the work we need to accomplish, but we also make time in that agenda to light our chalice and share our stories.

Unlike business meetings, meetings at the Fellowship have two functions: 1) attending to the business of the UUFWC, and 2) attending to the spirit of the congregation. We can dot a lot of i's, but if we are not growing the bonds that strengthen this community, what have we really accomplished? If we do not take the time to listen deeply to each other, how can we become a team able to accomplish the tasks before us?

In *Serving with Grace*, Erik Wickstrom suggests that meetings can be part of our spiritual practice. They can give us the opportunity to practice patience in listening to others, the opportunity to practice humility in resisting the temptation to show off our knowledge, and the opportunity to practice faith that others in the room can make contributions. At their best, our meetings reflect our UUFWC mission to be “. . . an inclusive community for spiritual exploration, dedicated to social and environmental justice.”

### *The Minister's Column*

In mid-January, I attended a lecture presented by Dr. James Cone. Of course, I knew this “founder” of Black Liberation Theology from my seminary days. I was curious whether the message had changed. It hasn't. Cone quoted the Hebrew prophet Amos, “Let justice roll down like water and righteousness as an ever-flowing stream” and then lifted up the Civil Rights Movement as the greatest movement for change in our country's history. He talked of how Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. would hate being memorialized by people more interested in paying homage than in advocating for the poor who are struggling all around us. “It's ALWAYS the right time to do what is right for the poor and the weak!” In Cone's eyes, King was even more radical than Rev. Jeremiah Wright, but “dead men make convenient heroes.” King had a dream, but the poor are living the American nightmare; “the dream will not come”, Cone said, “until everybody is included in it.”

Dr. Cone doesn't have much love for Thomas Jefferson with his beautiful words that exclude everyone but white males of property. Well, my little Unitarian Universalist soul balked at that a bit, but it did occur to me that the Declaration of Independence could serve our “5 Year Plan”. From Tianamin Square, to the Arab Spring and from immigration to Occupy Wall Street, there is energy bubbling up everywhere. Freedom is by nature contagious and we need to expand the definition of humanity until, Cone shouts, “We don't leave NOBODY out!”

February is Black History month. It is, also, a month in which we will be celebrating Charles Darwin. Change is inevitable. What is our role in taking down the walls? “Love,” Cone says, “is always standing right beside Justice.” May it be so.

## "It Feels Like Home To Me"

That's what new members say when they join. It's what our veteran members and friends say. It's what our young people say. And it is the theme of the 2012 Stewardship Campaign. We will launch our annual Stewardship Campaign in February to provide the resources to keep our home staffed and 'to keep the lights on.' Right now, Sandy Sheffield and I are recruiting visiting stewards to help raise the funds needed and connect folks who want to volunteer but haven't figured out how what is needed fits their talents and time.

Michael Jaeb designed our brochure, and Anne Wilson helps every year with the mailings and bookkeeping. This year, the Finance Committee set our goal at \$185,000. This is not a 'dream goal' - this is a goal to provide the basics. Our visiting stewards will share their stories of their journeys to the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Wayne County and the importance the Fellowship holds in their lives, as well as how they keep connected and involved. And they will ask you to share your stories.

We know that the diversity we celebrate includes folks from different income levels, too. The visiting stewards will ask you to consider your annual pledge, and ask that those who can to consider an increase. If those who can give a little more do that, we will reach our monetary goal. If we involve more volunteers, maybe we can actually staff two identical RE programs, or assure that someone preps coffee between services, or that our various committees include everyone who wants to help.

Sandy and I will provide training for the visiting stewards. If we haven't already asked you and you want to help, contact one of us or call Helen's cell.

The more visiting stewards we have, the fewer calls each will need to make. You will find that the visits are really fun - last year, Gene and I were entertained by Stella Lowry. What a treat!

The Fellowship indeed feels like home to me and you are my family. Gene and I have felt the love when we were at our lowest, and are so very grateful for you all. Stewardship to me means that I need to do what I can to keep our flame lit for the generations to follow, so that long after I am gone, there will still be a blessed community where people celebrate diversity, children know that to question is an answer, and young people are our gifts to the world.

## *Social Action In Action*

### ***“The Power of Community” Film Showing and Discussion***

At a time when global crises can seem overwhelming, working to promote positive changes at the local level can help people feel more hopeful about the future.

That’s the message behind the film “The Power of Community,” which will be shown at no charge to the public on Saturday, February 11 at 7 PM at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Wayne County, 3186 Burbank Road, Wooster. This inspiring documentary explores the situation in Cuba following the fall of the Soviet Union, when fuel and food shortages crippled the country, and shows how neighbors worked together to grow their own food and find local solutions to their crisis.

The film is presented by Wooster Area Transition, a newly developing group dedicated to promoting resilience and local solutions to community needs in Wooster and neighboring areas. Inspired by the global Transition movement – a positive, community-based response to global climate, energy, and economic crises – Wooster Area Transition welcomes everyone who is interested in building on the successful community efforts already in place so that we can find creative local solutions to these global crises.

The film will be followed by discussion, ideas for future Wooster Area Transition projects, and a dessert potluck. There is no charge for the event, but people are encouraged to bring a dessert to share.

Michaelson offers a progressive take on gay rights – arguing that the moral principles in these texts favor acceptance of gays and lesbians, outweighing the handful of ambiguous verses so often cited by conservatives.
