The Minister's Column

January was such a monumental month, it is hard to imagine what February will bring. Most importantly, the "Women's March in Washington" extended so far beyond women and beyond Washington. Muslims, Immigrants, GLBTQ folks, the poor, folks needing health care and folks demanding reproductive rights, people of all colors and of all ages, women and men and children...and dogs gathered in cities across the US and the world. Too many people to have any room to march [or even walk in some places] many were gatherings of people who simply showed up to be counted. Some were angry about the election...others were simply there to affirm that the US is a nation whose highest commitments were to welcome immigrants fleeing terror, trust our Muslim neighbors as much as our other neighbors, and enhance the lives of all people, not just a small elite percentage.

As I finish reading "White Trash" [Nancy Isenberg], it becomes more and more clear what all these issues have in common. Since 1620 and before, there has been an assumption of who the "deserving" people are, and who they are not. The folks now showing up to say, "We will NOT go back" are the people who would have-at some point in our history-been the "waste people": good for necessary labor but not much else, economic tools. (See the meeting note, below.)

Now-as in periods of the past-it is time for us to decide who we are as a nation and as an international player. We need to spell out what it means to "Go High not Low" in specificity rather than in ideological generalities. This will challenge us as Unitarian Universalists as much as it will challenge others. We need to talk with and LISTEN to ALL others who will talk and LISTEN to us; it is also our task to know when to walk away. We need to LIVE our Principles rather than simply reciting them and to reflect at the end of each day just how successful we have been. This is a learning time as well as an action time...and we are able. We ARE able, together.

White Rage: An In-depth Discussion

A Message from Youth Community

Members of Youth Community continued to learn, grow, and serve as we welcomed 2017. In our first RE (Religious Education) *Popcorn Theology* sessions of the year, the youth reflected on divine power and prayer. The youth read prayers from a variety of faith traditions and cultures, discussing similarities, differences, and the function of prayer. After watching select scenes from the film *Bruce Almighty*, we discussed the concept of divine power and miracles. We had an interactive discussion about times that we feel empowered, and times that we do not. We wrapped up our study with a reminder that, as Unitarian Universalists, if we want to see a miracle, we need to be the miracle. We had awesome community discussions!

We held our Winter Lock-In the weekend of January 14-15. Ten youth gathered with Adult Allies to deepen community bonds, plan future social action projects, and have fun. The lock-in began with a pizza dinner and a getting-to-know-you game. Judy Smith spoke to Youth Community about Cocoa House, a social outreach project and fundraiser the youth will assist with in March. The youth practiced skits for the Cocoa House event. We wrapped up the evening with games, a *Popcorn Theology* session, snacks, and a midnight reflection service. Our lock-in concluded Sunday morning with a community breakfast. We slept very little, but the laughter and bonding were great! Thank you to everyone who contributed time and goodies for our successful lock-in event.

In February, Youth Community will gather to decorate Valentine cookies and create greeting cards (dates and times to be announced). We will begin our monthly middle/high school game nights in February, too. Game nights will be in the Youth Room from 6:00pm to 8:00pm on the second Wednesday of each month. As we look towards March, the youth will help set up, run, and clean up our 3rd annual Cocoa House on March 18 from 6:30pm to 9:00pm. Youth in grades 8 to 10 will continue to explore sexual and personal health topics through the high school OWL (Our Whole Lives) curriculum. We look forward to creating community together!

In summary, 127 older, active, satisfied people filled out the survey. Most meaningful is the Sunday service, the sermon and our community of friends. Our needs, whether spiritual or social, are largely met ‘very well’. Eating together is the preferred way to get to know each other better. We stay informed by reading the newsletter. If we attend with children, the RE program is well regarded. We will probably have something similar to the Living the Principles services and programming—but with a different focus.

Not everyone falls into this description. 28 people would like to be more involved, or involved in something different. Adult RE could be improved, especially by offering more variety. 47 people would like to be more involved in social justice projects.





Social Action In Action

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF YOUR ADVANTAGE CARD: If you have a Buehler's Advantage Card you are aware that after accumulating a number of points you are eligible to have \$10 deducted from your grocery bill. Are you aware that instead, you can request a \$10 gift card? This card can be donated to the UFWC Emergency Fund which Rev. Strawn uses to assist members of our congregation in need. If the \$10 is a bonus, rather than a necessity for you, please consider donating it to benefit fellow members.

OPEN PLATE COLLECTION: Our February 26th Open Plate collection will be donated to the well-respected, non-church affiliated program in Orrville called Friendship Meals. An average of 50 to 75 people are served a nutritious meal each Thursday at the Christ United Church of Christ on North Market St. The UFWC has been supporting this neighborly effort for many years, first as the "Day of Change" collection coinciding with the first Sunday of Daylight Saving Time, and now as part of our Open Plate collections.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE: January "Souper Sunday" was certainly "super". In addition to five bags of canned soup, \$215 in cash and checks was donated. Thanks to all who were able to contribute.

All Things Green

RED ROCK CANYON LANDS UPDATE: In 2013, Clayton Daughenbaugh, Midwest Field Organizer for the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance and Chair of the Sierra Club's National Wildlands Committee, presented at a Sunday service a multi media slide show documenting citizens' efforts to gain wilderness designation for the public lands of the red rock canyon lands of southern Utah. This is the largest remaining network of unprotected wild lands in the lower 48 states, and is threatened by off-road vehicle abuse, oil and gas development and sprawl. Following his presentation our congregation signed postcards for President Obama asking him to protect the region under the Antiquities Act and wrote cards to U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown asking him to co-sponsor the Red Rock Wilderness Act.

Since that time, these efforts have been continued by tribal groups, the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance and the Sierra Club to achieve protection for the Bear's Ears area which comprises 1.35 million acres of the red rock canyon lands in the Four Corners region. On December 28, 2016 President Obama issued a proclamation under the Antiquities Act designating the Bear's Ears National Monument. This site includes over 100,000 archeological sites and is the first national monument designated at the request of Native American tribal governments. Unfortunately, the Utah congressional delegation is vowing to seek repeal of the Monument. The intent is to open this land for oil, gas and shale oil development and to open roads for recreational use. You can continue to help by sending emails to Senator Sherrod Brown and Senator Rob Portman asking them to defend the Bears Ears National Monument.
