The Minister's Column

So, does our time together focus on social action or on meditation? Do we march or do we pray? The question is not a new one, for religious bodies have always existed amidst a world struggling to make meaning of life. Just such a breach threatened the earliest Christian church as the convert Paul debated with Jesus' brother James in a theological standoff over the importance of faith versus works. Paul focused on the necessity of faith in Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection to save the world. Others, such as James, believed that people were faithful only if their actions testified to the importance of this new Christocentric faith.

The Reformation revived this debate as the Roman Catholic Church (with its focus on works/actions) and the Protestant reformers (who professed that people need have only faith in what God had already done); this is an oversimplification, of course, but the bottom line is, "Where do we put the most energy?" Can we save ourselves through action (in caring for our neighbor, protecting the environment, protesting unjust laws), or must we focus on spiritual practices and faith?

For Unitarian Universalists, the question is not so much whether we can save ourselves or whether only God can save us...the question is how we spend our resources of time and finances, of talents and insights. Within our congregation are people who need faith within our time together: a time of support, and reflection, and spiritual depth. It is no avoidance of working for justice in the world; they do this all during the week. There is simply need of spiritual succor, a strength with which to face the world. Others see no reason for our congregation to exist other than to fight for justice. It is well known among us that our faith tradition focuses much more on making the world a better place than on creating a better place for us to go when we die.

We are very different in our needs and I hope we are very patient in recognizing that our needs are very different. I hope that you will continue to talk to me so that we can make this congregation a vital part of your life and support as you go to do the work that you need to do in the world. May this be a place of growth, of sustenance, of challenge and of liberation.

THE MARCH 26TH OPEN PLATE COLLECTION will be donated to Orrville's highly respected Central American Medical Outreach (CAMO). This organization "provides more than 140,000 life-saving services each year" focusing on training and education, medical services and community development in an area of the world desperately in need of help. Not only does CAMO enlist volunteer medical staff, they also train local doctors and build support networks. Each year Honduras, for example, receives between 6 – 8 40 ft. shipping containers packed in Ohio with essential medical supplies. ORGANIC, UP. Not only does consumer demand for organically produced food keep going up, but such major producers as General Mills and Kellogg are switching to greater use of organic ingredients. As of last June, the number of America's certified organic farms was 14,979 (up by more than 6 percent from a year earlier), and sales of organic products zoomed up by 11 percent to \$43.3 billion in 2015, about four times more than the growth in conventional food sales. This remarkable rise would have gone even higher, but the demand for organic is now outstripping the supply! *Hightower Lowdown, January 2017*
